## SUMMER READING BINGO CHALLENGE

Reading for pleasure has a very positive impact on educational performance. The UK government's Education Research Standards Team tells us, "Evidence suggests that there is a positive relationship between reading frequency, reading enjoyment and attainment."

Over the last few years, we have introduced many successful strategies in helping children to discover the joy of reading and as a result, their comprehension, vocabulary and writing are all improving. However, sometimes, this progress can dip over the summer for some children so we have come up with ideas to help keep up this interest so that the interest and joy continues:

- 1. This summer, we are asking all children to compete a Summer reading Bingo Challenge. The Bingo card has 25 ways to read over the holidays eg. 'Read to a younger child', 'read under a tree' etc. Each time one is complete, the parent/ carer signs the bingo card on that spot. If the children achieve all 25 slots, they return the card to school and will receive a certificate for being a summer reading champion.
- 2. You can listen to the authors themselves reading all or part of their books. It's a great way to find out a little more about the authors too. Click the link below BooksForTopics: Storytime Online
